Reallirmation of Accreditation

FROM THE SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS COMMISSION ON COLLEGES



Brescia University was reaffirmed in its accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) at its annual meeting in Houston, Texas (December 8-10). SACSCOC is the regional body for the accreditation for degree-granting higher education institutions in the southern states. Regional accreditation is considered the gold standard of all accreditations and guarantees to students, parents, and others that the education that Brescia provides is at the expected quality for a higher education institution. The accreditation came with no findings, no recommendations, and no additional monitoring report required.

Brescia University President, Fr. Larry Hostetter stated, "Every ten years Brescia University goes through an exhaustive review by SACSCOC to guarantee the high quality of the Brescia educational experience. I am deeply grateful to all of the staff and faculty for all of their hard work that led to this very positive outcome of our decennial review. Reaffirmation of accreditation with no additional monitoring report highlights not only the diligence of our people in putting together the required report but also the dedication that they bring

to the Brescia Difference every day since we were last reaffirmed. Reaffirmation does not occur in a vacuum but because of the daily commitment of faculty and staff, to the Brescia Difference. Without

that commitment, we would not have had such a positive result."

SACSCOC requires all colleges and universities in the southeast to make a case once every decade that they are compliant with all 84 Core Requirements and Standards of the Principles of Accreditation. The process to get reaffirmed starts with a Compliance Certification, a Quality Enhancement Plan, an Off-Site Reaffirmation Review, an On-Site Reaffirmation Review, and finally a Review by the SACSCOC Board of Trustees. The On-Site Reaffirmation Review was held on the University's campus in March of this year. Accreditation is required for students to be eligible for federal and state student aid. It also affects the transferability of credits. Foundations and individuals who offer grants and donations are also interested in the quality of an institution's educational experience.

RECEIVES SACSCOC ACCREDITATION

Brescia University's Master of Science in Clinical Psychology received accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, or SACSCOC, on May 22, 2020. This accreditation was implemented on August 3rd, 2020 in conjunction with the first classes of the program being available.

Brescia University's Master of Science in Clinical Psychology program is designed to prepare students for various health care

services. Direct and supportive services include diagnosis and treatment of emotional and mental anxiety, or addictive disorders that affect the function of individuals, groups, or families. The Master of Science in Clinical Psychology program prepares students to meet the educational and practicum requirements necessary to become licensed as a psychological associate (LPA) in the state of Kentucky. For licensed psychological associates who are ready to apply for the next level of licensure in Kentucky, Brescia University offers the additional coursework students may need to become licensed as psychological practitioners.

From Fr. Larry Hostetter, President of Brescia

University, "From the founders of our University we have inherited an important ideal--"Read the Signs of the Times and Adapt." It is in that spirit that the creation of our new Masters in Clinical Psychology program takes root and from which it draws meaning for today. The fact that the faculty and staff who were involved in creating and implementing this new program were able to do so in the middle of a pandemic crisis says so much about the Brescia Difference and our deep desire to serve our students and the needs of our community."

Brescia University will offer on campus and online class options, workshops for major departments throughout the semesters, and individual tutoring to students for writing and research.

The University received a \$10,000 grant from the Owensboro Health to begin program development.

Brescia University recently received reaffirmation in its accreditation by SACSCOC, with no additional findings, no recommendations, and no additional monitoring report required.

Brescia University & COMP - 19

As Brescia University geared up for the spring semester, the novel coronavirus, COVID-19 began to circle the globe. In an update on March 11, 2020, Fr. Larry Hostetter laid the groundwork on which the COVID-19 response plan would be built: "our response has been built on the foundation of ensuring the safety of our students, staff, and faculty while also minimizing the disruption to our students' educational experience. Although there are currently no reported cases of COVID-19 in our immediate area, the probability that it will spread into our region is high. While we know we will be unable to eliminate all potential transmission of the virus, we can do our best to minimize it." In this same update, it was announced that all on-ground classes would be transitioned to online. At the time of the announcement, the hope was to return back to campus on April 14th, however that did not prove possible and the semester ended with all classes meeting online.

As the experts and local authorities learned more about the potential effects of COVID-19, athletic competitions and enrollment events were cancelled, and study abroad trips were suspended through the summer. The residence halls and O'Bryan's Dining Hall remained open, allowing students the ability to access resources as they remained on campus.

Soon after classes moved online, areas of common gathering on campus were closed, the gym, Bearcat Corner, and the Cat's Den. From Fr. Larry's update dated March 16, 2020: "the CDC issued a recommendation that all gatherings of 50 or more people be cancelled or postponed. The NAIA has now discontinued the spring athletic season to the entire semester. These measures were taken prevent the spread of the virus in places where students would gather. Faculty and staff were still working overtime in an effort to make the transition to online as seamless and possible.

On March 23rd Kentucky Governor Andy Beshear issued an order for all nonessential retail business to close, restaurants were ordered to provide carry out services only. This Healthy at Home order prompted Brescia to announce that all nonessential workers were to stay home. With only a handful of essential faculty and staff members on campus, students were still able to connect with those at home through the use of TEAMS and Zoom. During this time, Brescia made sure that no

employees where without a job. A temporary employee leave policy was placed into effect so that income and a job to come back to weren't on the list of many worries that employee were navigating in these uncertain times.

From Fr. Larry's update dated April 8, 2020: "graduation is so important every year. It gives us a chance to support our seniors, in love, as they leave Brescia to begin the next chapter in their lives. Unfortunately, because of the pandemic we will be unable to have a "normal" graduation. [...]Let me add how proud I am of all of you as you do your best to continue and complete your education in very difficult circumstances. As Governor Beshear reminds us every day, this is not the ideal, but we need to do it to defeat the Coronavirus. What we are doing today by staying at home and keeping our distance from others will ensure that more people will survive the pandemic. Your sacrifice will save lives; it is an act of love for health care workers,

for first responders, and for the most vulnerable of our community." A virtual graduation was held on May 2, 2020, and plans began for an in person graduation in December 2020.

Almost two months later employees were able to return to campus at a limited capacity. As part of the new policy, those with children or compromised family members were still able to work from home with no issues. Faculty and staff began working on the beginning plans for fall.

From Fr. Larry's reopening letter, "As in all things we fulfill our educational mission in the spirit of St. Angela Merici. I continue to be inspired by her use of the words from Daniel: "Those who teach others in the way of justice shall shine like stars for all eternity." In our tumultuous world, undergoing incredible social change, our students need us and we need them as they take their Brescia education to create a more just and compassionate world. Thank you for all you do as staff and faculty in bringing this vision to fulfillment."



BRESCIA UNIVERSITY AND OWENSBORO COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE ANNOUNCE

NEW TRANSFER AGREEMENT

Brescia University and Owensboro Community and Technical College (OCTC) announced a new transfer agreement that will impact students in all OCTC technical program offerings. The announcement took place on Wednesday, October 30, 2019 at OCTC's Main Campus, located at 4800 New Hartford Road. Presidents, Fr. Larry Hostetter, of Brescia University, and Dr. Scott Williams, of OCTC were both present as the agreement became effective immediately.

Brescia University and OCTC have two longstanding articulation agreements regarding the Associate of Arts (AA) and Associate of Science (AS) degrees. Brescia University accepts the AA or AS degree from OCTC, and from any of the sixteen colleges that make up the Kentucky Community & Technical College System (KCTCS). Those degrees transfer with 60 to 67 credits and allow the transfer student a junior class standing at Brescia. Historically, more than 150 students have transferred to Brescia from OCTC since 2009.

The new articulation agreement opens this opportunity to all students in OCTC technical programs that offer the Associate in Applied Science (AAS) degree. Students will be able to transfer up to 77 credit hours to Brescia towards a bachelor's degree in Integrated Studies. Brescia University has created a personalized degree option for students as they continue their higher education journey. This new agreement expands the opportunity for transfer for students in 23 additional OCTC programs including: Business Administration Systems, Computer & Information Technologies, Engineering & Electronics Technology, and numerous Allied Health programs.

OCTC's Williams added, "We have a longstanding partnership with Brescia and are always looking for additional ways we can collaborate to benefit students and our community."



AS/AAS degree from OCTC, we are ensuring that their graduates can join the Brescia University family and have access to a path towards a 4-year degree. BUconnections, the new Brescia University transfer initiative, is about more than transferring academic credit, it is also about creating a holistic experience for the student with individualized attention in areas like advising, tutoring, and career services to support their path to success," stated Dr. Lauren McCrary, Brescia University's Chief of Staff.

NEXT GENERATION SCIENCE STANDARDS & STEM BY: LYN

In Brescia University's School of Education Science Methods class this past semester, we began our focus on teaching the tools that our future science teachers need to incorporate the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) STEM lessons within their future elementary and middle school classrooms.

We began the semester by implementing The National Science Teaching (NSTA) Learning Center. This online textbook platform also consists of NGSS learning resource tools for the preservice teacher. The NSTA Learning Center allows Brescia's Science Methods class to engage with over 200,000 science teaching professionals, gauges knowledge in 25 different content areas, enables exploration of thousands of resources through NGSS lesson plans, science articles, higher education textbook chapters, and other professional development books. Students can also attend online and in-person professional development, track professional learning goals and activity, and allow connection with over 15 topical forums. This learning tool is not only available to the student during the Science Methods semester, but is also available to them when fully engaged in the teaching profession.

During the past semester,
Brescia School of Education
preservice teachers were also given
opportunities to be part of oncampus professional development.
Professionals in STEM activities

were invited to share their wealth of knowledge in their expert field.

Jamila Gadsden, Education Technology Consultant, with Texas Instruments, Inc., presented a hands-on STEM professional development workshop on TI technology as tools for inquiry and exploration. Through this workshop the students became familiar with the resources for STEM activities available through the TI Technology loan program for elementary and middle school STEM teaching.

Another STEM professional development that the Science Methods class explored in the Fall '19 semester was a computerbased, hands-on critical thinking workshop. F.L.E.E.T. Engineering with Michael Briscoe, Educatorin- Residence with the American Society of Naval Engineers of Alexandra, Virginia, presented the STEM engineering computer game (F.L.E.E.T). The workshop trained Brescia students in the program and in how to implement physical science and the engineering design process in real world learning Brescia's School Of situations. Education Department was also awarded a grant from the American Society of Naval Engineers (ASNE) purchase technology for incorporating STEM computerbased activities.




The 2019-2020 Honors College students had quite the eventful year from start to finish. Honors College faculty members Christopher Griffin, Daniel Kuthy, and Amanda Morris were quick to welcome incoming Honors students during Freshman orientation weekend in August. At this event, new Honor's College members are treated to a nice breakfast and are given the chance to meet some of their fellow classmates and professors. This year freshmen and sophomores were given the opportunity to take a class on Essential Physics, Race, Ethnicity, and Migration, or Democracy in America as their Honors level course.

In November, students in the freshmen level Essential Physics class traveled to Knoxville, Tennessee, to tour the Oak Ridge National Laboratory. While the Oak Ridge Laboratory is well known for its involvement in the Manhattan Project during WWII, the facility also focuses on scientific discovery, clean energy, and security technologies. Students were able to tour the laboratory and see many exhibits ranging from 3D printed cars to robotic programs on display. Over the course of this trip, students experienced the transfer of textbook knowledge to the real-world applications that occur every day.

The Race, Ethnicity, and Migration and the Democracy in America classes traveled to Atlanta, Georgia, where students visited the Carter Center, the Ghion Cultural Hall, and the King Center. The Carter Center presented students with information about President Jimmy Carter's life and accomplishments while advocating for democracy and the prevention of diseases. An exhibit

that explored the movie industry in Georgia was also one of the temporary expositions on display during the trip. From there, students pushed their culinarily boundaries by trying food from other cultures while eating dinner at the Ghion Cultural Hall. Finally, students received a guided tour of Martin Luther King Jr.'s house at the King Center. Attendees were able to take a step back in time to view the historically preserved area surrounding his house and view the nearby buildings have been restored to resemble the grounds as Martin Luther King Jr. would have known them.






DR. ELAINE WRIGHT, an Associate


