BRESCIA RECEIVES \$ 1.5 MILLION IN GIFTS FOR SECOND PHASE OF THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Brescia University has received a \$1 Million gift from the family of the late Charles Albert Reid, founder of Independence Bank, to name the Brescia University School of Business in his memory. The Charles Albert Reid School of Business will be located in Brescia University's new academic center for professional studies to be constructed on the corner of 9th and Frederica Streets.

In 1971, Mr. Reid and his brother-in-law, Maurice E. Reisz, purchased Farmers & Merchants Bank in McLean County as well as Providence State Bank in Webster County. In 1997, the two small banks were incorporated under one name, Independence Bank. After his passing in October 2001, his son Chris, also a Brescia graduate, took over his father's role as President that same year.


Today, the third generation of the Reid family, Jacob Reid and Lauren Patton, also third generation Brescia graduates, have assumed leadership roles within Independence Bank. Jacob serves as the Executive Vice President and Lauren as the Executive Director of the Independence Bank Foundation, the charitable arm of the bank.


"The Reid family has a long tradition of service to the Owensboro region and we are incredibly proud of this family of alumni. I am humbled and thankful for their generosity and investment in the future of our students. They are not only models of philanthropy but also great examples of applying Christian principles to business practices, especially in their commitment to servant leadership," stated Father Larry Hostetter, President of Brescia University.

Work, which recently received a \$500,000 grant from the James Graham Brown Foundation in Louisville, KY to expand and support the continued growth of the Marilyn Younger-Conley School of Social Work, potentially impacting thousands of lives. Brescia University will utilize the awarded funds to help construct a new academic building that will house the School of Social Work, to grow endowment funds, and to hire faculty to fully launch the new Master of Social Work program.

Enrollment in Brescia's School of Social Work has grown by 800 percent over the past eight years. The University has offered a traditional, on-ground Bachelors of Social Work (BSW) degree since 2004 and an online BSW degree since 2009. In 2016, an online Master of Social Work (MSW) degree was launched. These three programs represent 483 students at Brescia, 37% of total enrollment, and the numbers are anticipated to rise as the need for social workers in United States continues to increase.

The School of Education will also be housed in the Signature Building. Ground will be broken on the project in early 2018 as part of the second phase of The Campaign for Brescia University: Gateway to Our Second Century, following the completion of the first phase, the renovation of The Moore Center in mid-June. The construction of the building will cost approximately \$8 million, with a total campaign cost of \$15 million. The University has raised nearly \$12.1 million to date.





In 2015, Brescia University was awarded the largest grant in school history from the United States Department of Education as part of the Strengthening Institutions Program (SIP). More than \$1 million was designated to the establishment of the Ursuline Center for Teaching and Learning (UCTL) to increase retention and graduation rates through improved student achievement and enhanced faculty development.

Since then, the UCTL has provided the development of a new Computer Sciences lab, the expansion of the Communication Studies and Disorders Lab, and updates to technology, resources and equipment on campus.

Funding from the SIP Grant has also allowed faculty and staff to carry out activities with students that take learning outside the classroom, providing more hands on experiences. Students have had the opportunity to learn chemical processes at a distillery and car factory, visited museums and

libraries hosting ancient scripts and artifacts and traveled to professional conferences and workshops with faculty, locally and abroad.

The UCTL also added a Professional Advisor, Tom Pope, who helps students develop their academic skills and provides added support to freshmen and student athletes. In addition to supporting students, Tom also implemented the Sophomore Peer Mentor Program, which engages juniors and seniors as mentors to sophomores. Darlene Runyon also joined the team as the Educational Technology Specialist, providing professional development for faculty in the areas of technology that can be used in and out of the classroom, including incorporating new forms of technology in their lectures and classroom activity.

This summer the UCTL is working to renovate the Physics Lab and the Observatory, adding new equipment and space.



Esports Team & Competitive Cheer And Dance Team

Brescia University will add eSports, as well as competitive cheer and dance, to their athletic department as intercollegiate sports starting in Fall 2017.

"Brescia University's strategic plan calls for continued growth of enrollment and continued development and promotion of an athletic culture," stated Father Larry Hostetter, President. "The addition of both an eSports program and a competitive cheer and dance program will allow us to not only work towards both of these goals, but it will expand the difference that Brescia University can make in the lives of students by providing additional scholarships to incoming students with a variety of interest."

eSports is an emerging form of competitive gaming and Brescia University will be one of only two private schools in the Commonwealth to offer eSports as a varsity sport. Brescia University will be joining the University of Pikeville, who announced their inclusion of the program early last year, as part of the National Collegiate eSports Association (NACE), an organization dedicated to unifying the collegiate eSports under one governing body.

While eSports is not formally recognized by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), the organization will be supporting the program and will be providing the eligibility requirements for students participating.


Brescia University has already signed seven students to compete and is offering scholarships to talented League of Legends players, with additional games added as the program develops. Students representing Brescia University for eSports will compete against NCAA Division 1 schools at the varsity level in a variety of competitive matches.

"We are proud to be a founding member of NACE and for our eSports students to compete at the varsity level," said Joshua Clary, Vice President for Student Affairs, who serves on the NACE Board of Directors. "My goal for any of our student athletes is to have a holistic experience at Brescia. By adding eSports to our scholarship athletic program, we will compete against the best collegiate eSports programs from around the country. Our eSports athletes will complete the same requirements for the Champions of Character program with the NAIA and will perform community service like our existing varsity sports."

The eSports program will mirror that of Brescia University's other championship athletic programs, providing students with a holistic experience that challenges them mentally and physically, and trains them mind, body and soul.

Brescia University will also be adding competitive cheer and dance to their offerings, as one of only two independent schools in Kentucky that offer scholarships for the sport. The program will be co-ed and will involve students participating in competitions, as well as, cheering at Brescia University athletic events.

Kendal Connor, a native of Whitesville, was named the head coach of the newly added sport in March. She is a graduate of Trinity High School in Whitesville, Kentucky. She holds an Associate of Arts



degree from Owensboro Community and Technical College and has been the Assistant Dance Coach at Daviess County High School since 2012.

During her six years with the team, they have won numerous competitions, including five regional grand championships, and placing in the top 10 at NDA Nationals for five years. Most recently, she helped lead the Pantherettes of Daviess County High School to a state title at the 2017 State Dance Competition. The team will compete at the national level in March 2017.

"I am so excited to have this opportunity to work at Brescia University," stated Connor. "I'm honored to have been chosen to be the coach for this soon-tobe amazing program. I have a lot of plans and goals for my team, and can't wait to get started!"

Kendall has signed four new students to the team, and has eight students who will be joining the team as walk-ons.



BIOCHEMISTRY STUDENTS CONDUCT STUDY ON ROSES

Students taking laboratory classes with Dr. Jacob Adler have been conducting research on the rose rosette disease, a disease that presents itself in all rose types as very large thorns, wilting floral petals, and thick gnarly stems, for the past three years. The disease is comparable to the rapid cell growth seen in human cancers and is destroying the global rose supply, especially in the Midwestern United States, and locally in Owensboro, Kentucky. In fact, the work of the students helped identify infected roses on campus that are being removed to prevent the further spread of the disease to other roses on campus.

The rose rosette disease is caused by the rose rosette virus, which is transmitted by mites from rose to rose and works similar to the relationship between AIDS and its virus, HIV, in humans.

"It is important that scientists work together as a team to unlock the mysteries of this disease, so that all of us may $\frac{1}{2}$

continue to give and receive roses for all our special occasions. If we don't act soon, we might not be so fortunate," stated Dr. Adler

Recent work with Dr. Adler's biochemistry students was just published this spring in the Kentucky Journal of Undergraduate Scholarship about the disease and how it manipulates the rose's genome. Prior to this study, there were no reports on how this virus works at the biochemical level. Dr. Adler and his students hope that the work they did will help to be able to identify the biochemical pathways of the disease and then use common molecular methods to cure infected plants.

"I am very proud of these students and their hard work, especially the two lead authors Andrew Beams and Eva Burelos. In one year, these two took this project from discovery to manuscript publication. That takes a lot of effort," said Adler. The research data submitted by the students was accepted through the process of scientific peer-review, which means that outside researchers in this field have deemed this work to be valuable and beneficial to include in the journal. "At just \$90 a class, this gives our students an incredible opportunity to further their education. We cannot thank Brescia enough for offering this prospect for our students," said Dr. Nick Brake, OPS Superintendent.

"When the Owensboro Innovation Academy presented

this partnership to us, we felt it to be a perfect fit. Our institutions share the same intimate, one-on-one learning experience that caters to the educational needs of each student," stated Father Larry Hostetter, President of Brescia University. "We admire the innovative educational approach that OIA provides students, and we are honored to be an extension of that educational experience. By taking classes at Brescia University, our hope is that the students at OIA will benefit from direct learning at the collegiate academic level that will allow them to seamlessly transition into college and find success in their lives," added Father Larry.

The partnership will also allow all OIA students to use the new health complex that is currently under construction at Brescia.

"Our students will get to use brand new facilities as part of a comprehensive wellness plan for each student. This ensures that our students are not only getting a quality education in STEM fields, but will hopefully improve their overall health," said Beth Benjamin, OIA principal.

"From day one, Brescia has opened its doors to OIA students and staff to offer unique spaces for different learning activities. Maer Min Bessings BRINGING CLEAN THIRSTY CHILDREN

ith a staff of one full-time and three part-time employees, along with approximately 40 volunteers, a nonprofit organization based in Middletown, Kentucky, brings water to some of the poorest places in the world.

Water With Blessings works in 37 countries, including Haiti, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Kenya. Stephanie Kornexl, who serves as the part-time partnership lead with Water With Blessings, said the group's mission is to "partner with mothers and missioners to bring clean water to God's thirsty children."

According to the World Health Organization, at least 1.8 billion people worldwide rely upon a contaminated water source. These sources can transmit diseases such as cholera, dysentery, typhoid, polio, and dengue fever. The contaminated sources can also cause diarrhea or infection by worms. Diarrhea alone accounts for more than 800,000 deaths per year. At least 300,000 of those deaths are children under the age of 5. Schistosomiasis, a chronic disease caused by parasitic worms that breed in contaminated water sources, affects almost 240 million people worldwide. Many of these deaths can be prevented simply by providing access to a consistent source of clean water, according to the WHO.

Based on their experience doing medical mission trips to Tegucigalpa, Honduras, Arnie LeMay of Eminence, Kentucky, Jim Burris of Frankfort, Kentucky, and Sister Larraine Lauter of Louisville, Kentucky, discerned the need for an organization to address the causes of these ailments. The hospital engineer, architect, and Ursuline sister found themselves returning each year to treat the same illnesses, caused primarily by ingesting water contaminated with parasites.

The three friends — and eventual cofounders of Water With Blessings — felt helpless that they were merely treating the symptoms rather than the causes. Then they had an insight: If they could clean up the water sources, they would eliminate much of the patient load. In 2006 they began exploring various water solutions, which ultimately led to their organization's use of the Sawyer PointOne water filtration system.

Carol Lyvers, a Water With Blessings mission partner, attends St. Bartholomew Catholic Church in Columbus, Indiana, which has had a sister parish in Haiti for nearly 25 years. She said her parish has used many water systems, but each has always had some issue, whether it's parts breaking or chemicals being required to maintain the system. However, according to Lyvers, "The WWB approach addressed all of these issues with the added bonus of each filter supplying clean water for several families."

When Water With Blessings visits a poor country, they train local people on how to set up and operate the filters. The filters function similarly to how kidney dialysis does, filtering out contaminants in water in order to make it safe to drink. The filters hold five gallons of water, require no electricity to operate, and are guaranteed for millions of gallons of safe filtered water.

Water With Blessings aims to bring these filters to regions abroad that have no access to clean water and provide training to mothers so that they can operate the filters.

According to Kornexl, Water With Blessings partners primarily with mothers and empowers them as "water women" because they are ideal candidates for helping share the filters with the local community. She said that the water women "make a faith-based commitment, for we know that adding 'the God-spark' will charge and sustain a mother for compassionate, joyful service to her neighbors." The mothers then sign a covenant,

making a commitment that they will use their filter to help not only their own family but also those around them.

Mary Meyers, a Water With Blessings mission partner from the Diocese of Joliet (Illinois), said during one of her missions to Sucre, Bolivia, she saw that the filters they had brought the year before to the Mission Esperanza free medical clinic were being used to provide water not just for the patients but also for a nearby school.

"Two of them take turns filtering water for the school, and one filters water for the clinic using a water clinic that they taped a Water With Blessings sign to," Meyers said.

In response to an April 2016 earthquake in Ecuador, Water With Blessings partnered with various congregations of Ecuadorian sisters to distribute and train people in the operation of filters. To date, they have trained nearly 5,500 people in order to distribute clean water to survivors.

Father Joseph Mungai, a Kenyan priest who works with the Franciscan Missionaries Sisters of Hope, has worked with Water With Blessings to distribute Sawyer PointOne filters to his parishioners at St. John the Apostle, Awasi, in the Diocese of Kisumu in Kenya. He has been able to distribute 100 filters in the six months since he began partnering with the organization. Father Mungai said that, before receiving the filters, he would often stop to get water during the workday, only to find that the water offered to him "was always brown in color and could be easily mistaken for tea."

In the past year, Water With Blessings has equipped almost as many water women with filters and training as in all the years since it became a nonprofit in 2011. The organization now totals nearly 25,000 members worldwide.

"Water With Blessings' plan is to continue to grow its worldwide community of water women in accord with God's abundant grace,"

Sister Larraine Lauter, OSU, is Water With Blessings' executive director. In 2015 she was named a distinguished alum of Brescia University in Owensboro, Kentucky. She subsequently began working with the college's Caritas Leadership Program.

"The Caritas program is designed to provide students with the opportunity to develop their own leadership abilities, explore leadership opportunities on campus, and envision ways in which they can be leaders in their communities by embracing the ideals of Caritas theology and leading because of the love they have for others," said Josh Clary, the university's vice president of student affairs and dean of students.

The program culminates with an eight-day service and pilgrimage experience with Water With Blessings in which students travel to Honduras to work and pray alongside the local women.

"We love working with WWB because students are provided with an opportunity to put Caritas into action," Clary said. "The transformation within the students because of this service is as much our goal as is the tangible work of helping to provide clean water."




